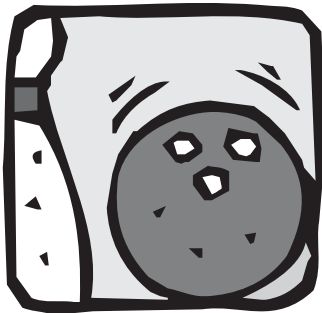

McIver, Malmgren and Eric's sister, Jennifer Champagne, both bowl on a tough shot out at Hi-Line Lanes in Burien. So the challenging shot of the Pyramid was a piece of cake to them. They out-distanced the second place team #1 Hefe Weizen with **Matt Boyle**, **Angela Stefanski**, and **John Poulsen** by 33 points.

The Pyramid tournament consists of three bowlers, one of which has to be female. The team entering maximum is 600. The tournament this year moved from Sunset, which is no longer, out to Robin Hood Lanes in Edmonds.

Bryan Young Wins an Eagle

34 year old Bryan Young of Everett, Wa achieved what most bowlers can only dream of at the USBC championship tournament in Albuquerque New Mexico. He bowled the highest three game set of the singles portion of the tournament, with games of 278, 286, and 268 for an amazing 832. He also was second in all-events with a 2165. I sat down and talked with him about his monumental feat.

STE: Who were you bowling with in Albuquerque?

Bryan: Chuck Ickes and Jesse McKinney were on my team. I bowled doubles with Chad Smith.

STE: Did you have a feeling you were going to do well at the start of the tournament?

Bryan: I was bowling doubles and kind of watching the pair we were going to in singles, and it looked like I would have a lot more push room to the right than I had in doubles. I shot 679 in doubles so I didn't do too bad on that pair.

STE: You only missed striking once each in the first two games and only twice in the third.

Bryan: I had the front 10 in the second game, then I left the 4-7-10 split.

STE: What kind of ball did you use?

Bryan: I threw the Visionary Ogre SS. It was definitely the right ball for the conditions. I pretty much throw Visionary equipment exclusively.

STE: Are you sponsored by them?

Bryan: No, but ever since I bowled at WSU in the mid-90s I've been throwing Visionary equipment. I got turned onto them by a friend's mother who runs a Pro Shop in Utah.

STE: Who drills your equipment?

Bryan: Corey Gardner at Secoma Lanes. He does a great job.

SITE: What are your future plans?

Bryan: Just to bowl league once a week at Majestic, and tournaments.

STE: Any PBA stuff?

Bryan: No. Visionary is not endorsed by the PBA, so I couldn't throw my equipment in a PBA tournament.

STE: One final question, was there a lot of people watching your bowling at the tournament?

Bryan: You know I really couldn't tell. I was really concentrating on my game and high-fiving my friends. It worked out great!

Bryan Young won \$4000 for his first place finish.

As Fall Leagues Begin, Know Where Your Bread is Buttered... *By Jerry Ledbetter*

We all know how it feels at the start of the bowling league season. We are excited, yet leery of the condition our bowling game will be in. We stroll into the center with our bags in tow, and everything we need is ready and waiting for us. But who gets all of that ready for us? Who takes care of us on a weekly basis? Our league secretaries do, that's who!

Take a moment to visualize all that your league secretary does for you. Every season, he/she gathers data together from the previous season, contacts all team captains (each individual bowler in some cases); trying to maintain or grow the league through communication with bowlers as well as the bowling center. He/she then assigns teams, collects USBC sanction cards and fees, then submits them to USBC. Week after week he/she deciphers numerous hand-written recap sheets, enters the scores, prints the league sheets and recaps, balances the league finances, submits awards, and plans special events such as league fundraisers and end-of-season banquets.

On any given week, league secretaries may also have to deal with team/score/rule disputes, new bowler orientation, league drop-outs and vacancy issues. All of this and they're supposed to bowl, too? It's a difficult position to fill, and we should all appreciate what our secretaries do for us.

One way to show your appreciation is by participating in your local association's Secretary of the Year award program. By nominating your league secretary, you'll be telling him/her that you understand the extra effort they put forth week-in and week-out in order to ensure that our bowling game has the best opportunity to shine.

Bowling Should Be an Olympic Sport

With the Summer Olympic Games concluding in Beijing China this past week, it makes us bowlers think once again how cool it would be if Bowling were an Olympic Sport.

The criteria for an Olympic Sport, according to Olympic officials, an activity must be "widely practiced by men in at least 75 countries on four continents, and by women in at least 40 countries on three continents". In other words, participation matters.

Upwards of 150 million people bowl every year, in over 125 countries, making it the second highest participation sport in the world, yet the closest it has gotten to medal recognition in the Olympics is a demonstration sport in the 1988. As a participation sport, bowling is a slam dunk for the Olympics.

Bowling is a sport enjoyed by all kinds of people all over the world. It is estimated that 46% of the participants are women, making it a relatively gender equal sport. It is a ten billion dollar industry with Professional Tours on three continents, The USA, Europe, and Asia. The television ratings for bowling are constantly high in comparison to other sports. The scoring system in bowling does not involve judges, rack 'em up, knock 'em down, count up the score, and you know who won.

To the best of my knowledge, there has not been any doping scandals in bowling. No judging controversies. An easy to understand scoring system, which is a great way to teach children addition and division. Imagine the possibilities of the fashion in Bowling at the Olympic level.

In order to gain medal status in the Olympics, a sport must be voted on and receive approval from 2/3 of the IOC (International Olympic Committee) board. Also, the IOC hesitates to add a sport unless another sport is removed; they seem to be happy with the size of the program. There are some sports that will not return in the 2012 Summer Olympics. Based on the criteria of participation, worldwide audience interest, marketing potential, gender equality, and objective scoring system, bowling by all means deserves serious consideration.

Wouldn't it be cool if bowling were in the Olympics? Just imagine what would happen to the perception of the sport (at birthday and company parties, not to mention organized leagues and tournaments) if you could win a gold medal in the Olympics! The possibilities are....well one can only imagine.

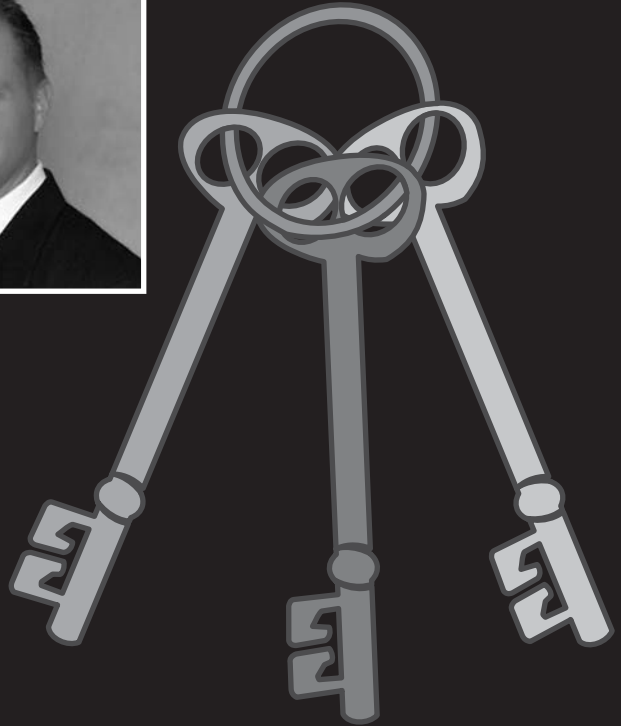

Amateur or Professional Revisited

This is in reply to an article in the July/August 2008 issue of the STE Bowling News, written by Hugh Miller.

One of the definitions of a professional is a person who is engaged in a specific activity for pay. So anyone who bowls for money is a pro, leagues, tournaments, whatever. The PBA does not have a copyright on the word pro. They are just an organization that call themselves, the Professional Bowlers Association. The Western Handicap Bowling Association from years ago billed themselves as the little guys pro tour, and rightly so. The participants were bowling for money. The levels of professionalism are quite varied. Look at our Mariners, a pro is a pro is a pro.

The High Roller Tournament Bowling Organization only restricts current PBA members, and past national and senior national champions, either as a guest or as a member. All a PBA member has to do is drop their membership to be HR eligible. A significant number have done this over the years. The reason the HR restricts the PBA is because it is a for profit organization. They have tried in the past to allow PBA members to bowl. As recently as the 2006 & 2007 August tournaments, the attendance was down dramatically. The PBA members didn't even support it. A non PBA member bowling a PBA tournament is referred to as a guest, not an amateur. Nationwide, approximately 25% of the field for regional tourna-

ments is made up of guests. If it wasn't for the guests, the prize money would be off that 25%. So the regionals thrive by allowing the guests to bowl and the HR by not allowing the PBA in. It's a win, win for both organizations.

As for Nick Morgan winning a national senior PBA event as a guest and complaining about not being able to bowl the HR, he is grossly ignorant of the HR rules. The HR emphatically states in the entry form that no current member of the PBA and or past national and senior national champions, either as a guest or member, are eligible, period... I let my 10-year-old nephew read that part and he fully understood what it meant.

The financially strapped PBA would not be in existence today if it wasn't for the bailout by a non-PBA bowler, Chris Peters, who bowled on the amateur bowlers tour. That's kind of ironic, I think.

It is deluded thinking that amateur golfers do not play for real money. Literally millions of dollars are exchanged on any given weekend across the United States through various formats such as nassaus, calcuttas, skins games, match and medal play, etc., etc. I know first hand, as I have been involved in more than a few of these. Pat Johns could bend your ear on this subject as well.

As for other sports, such as baseball, football, basketball, etc., scholarships are given out that amount to thousands and thousands of dollars to the individuals in tuition fees and living expenses. They are being compensated quite well for being mere amateurs.

My respect for the PBA would be greatly enhanced if they would leave us non-PBA professionals to do our thing. I am sure the opinions of Mr. Miller, at least I hope, are not shared by the majority of the PBA members. What it boils down to is they need us, we don't need them to survive. At least on the regional level.

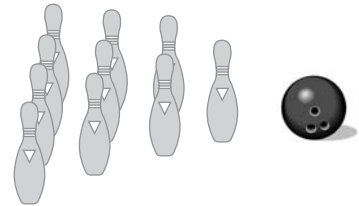

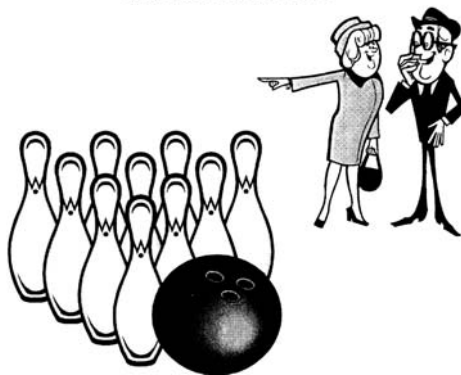
