At our recent Awards Banquet we recognized our tournament winners from our Adult and Youth Association tournaments. Being merged we have included the youth in the awards banquet and it has been great having them involved.

That evening we also inducted two individuals to our Hall of Fame. The first inductee was **Carolee Tighe**. Carolee had been involved with almost every committee at one time or another with the TWBA. Held several officer positions and was the last President of the TWBA and helped with the merger of the associations. She is currently a director of the South Sound USBC and is one of the most dedicated and hard working directors on the board. Her selection to the Hall of Fame was well deserved for her commitment to our sport and the local associations.

The second inductee was **Gary Glein**. Gary was actively involved as a junior bowler then school and work put bowling on the back burner for a time. Upon the sale of his business he began competing again and has enjoyed successes with local tournament victories and eight 300 games and two 800 series. He became a director of the GTBA and was an integral part of the transition team in the merging process. He developed the format for the Tacoma Senior Match Game senior league. This past year part of his Glein Family Foundation funds will be a scholarship to a youth bowler in the South Sound USBC. The first recipient was Kai Pedro.

One of the highlights of the evening was the presentation of national awards to 4 youth bowlers from the South Sound. These four bowlers posted a team game of 1059 and team series of 2948. Both of these scores were national highs for four boy team in the 19 to 22 age category. Only one of the four knew about the award so it was quite a surprise for the team. The team consisted of **Henry McMahon**, 649, **Jason Elwell**, 825, **Cory Ganwich**, 729, and **Jack Benedict**, 745. Quite an accomplishment for these four young men.

WHO IS TNBA?

The National Bowling Association Inc. (TNBA) is a non-profit corporation, organized in August 1939, in Detroit, Michigan, for the express purpose of encouraging Blacks to develop their skills in the game of Ten Pins. It was originally known as the "National Negro Bowling Association" because at the time of its birth, Negroes and other Non-Caucasians were not permitted to belong to ABC or WIBC because of certain restrictive clauses in their constitutions. Because our membership included a large number of Asians, Hispanics and people of color other than Black, in 1944, our organization was renamed "The National Bowling Association, Inc." We participated actively in the fight for "Equality in Bowling," and in 1950 both ABC and WIBC removed the Non-Caucasian clauses from their constitutions. Starting in 1951 TNBA members have enjoyed the privilege of competing in all open sanctioned tournaments.

The constitutional purpose of TNBA is to foster and promote the game of Ten Pins among both men and women. Membership is open to all bowlers, without regard to race, creed or color. Members of TNBA must also hold USBC cards.

TNBA promotes friendship, sportsmanship

and fellowship among its members. We also serve as a recruiting agency and point-of-entry for minority bowlers who otherwise would not receive the encouragement, tutelage and guidance needed to learn the game and develop the skills that are essential to full enjoyment and successful competition. Such encouragement and training prepares TNBA bowlers to compete on equal terms in the tournament and competitions that are now open to them.

TNBA has been and continues to be a major factor in the integration of blacks into the "bowling world" and plays a part in the national movement toward implementation of American democracy, ideals and principles. The acquaintance that comes with contact and the respect that is engendered by superior skill helps break down unfavorable attitudes and racial barriers.

TNBA membership means unity and strength through organization and the sense of belonging to a dedicated, purposed and progressive group. The National Bowling Association, Inc., presently in its 65th year, has over 23,000 members contained in over one

hundred local senates (chapters) throughout the United States including Bermuda. It is not necessary to be a bowler to belong to TNBA.

The National Bowling Association, Inc. adult programs consist of: League Bowling Competition, High Score Achievement Awards, Four (4) Regional Tournaments, National Championship Tournaments, Five (5) Classic Tournaments, Rhodman Classic Roll-off, National Honor (Individual) Awards, Hall Of Fame, Celebrity Bowl Tournament, King and Queen Contest, Sponsor Appreciation Awards, Local Achievement Honor Awards, Charity and Fund Raising Programs, and Intra-Senate (Chapter) Bowling Competition.

The youth bowling programs include league competition, achievement awards, regional and national tournaments. The present membership of TNBA's Junior Bowling Program is 8,000 youngsters between the ages of six (6) and

twenty-two (22) years, representing one hundred-plus senates and affiliates.

The local chapter of TNBA is named the Emerald City Senate. We have a general membership meeting 5 times a year on the second Sunday at AMF Imperial Lanes. The Emerald City league also bowls at that center. We host monthly 9-Pin No Tap tournaments on the first Saturday of the month at Imperial and sponsor an inter-city singles tournament with Portland each March.

Dick Weber, Bowling's Ambassador

This past month a new DVD about the career of bowling legend Dick Weber became available. It was written and produced by Bill McCorkle, a friend of the Weber family, also an accomplished PBA bowler. I can tell you it is a must see for any bowling fan.

After viewing the video for the first time, I recalled my own personal Dick Weber story, which represents how much he was truly an ambassador for the sport of bowling.

I decided to return to the PBA tour in the fall of 2001, after a five year hiatus. In 2000, three former Microsoft executives purchased the PBA, added prize money, changed the season and format, and launched the "new" PBA tour, with the first event scheduled in the second week of September. The events of 9/11 changed all of that. The first event in Wichita was cancelled (as were most sporting events that week), the season opener would now take place the following week at Landmark Lanes in Peoria, Illinois.

The lanes at Landmark were tough, a "sport" pattern on worn wood lanes, with guardian overlay. It took about 30 over to make the top 64 (a 204 average). I slogged my way to 40 some over and snuck in the top 64, just barely. I had to pick up the pace the next day to make match play. I did just that, bowling constantly, avoiding the bad game, and I was about 140 over with two games remaining. Still, I needed a couple of 230's, it looked like about 190 over (just over a 210 average) would make the cut. Also, I was crossing with Pete Weber. His parents (Dick and Juanita) were following our foursome. How often have you had Dick Weber follow your whole day of bowling?

Game eight started with a strike and a spare. I then strung seven in a row, I got up in the tenth frame with a chance to strike out for 280, and all but lock up a spot in the finals with one game remaining. I threw a great shot the first ball in the tenth, the kind of shot you just know is a strike

when you let it go. I started to run it out, and just as the ball entered the 1-2 pocket, I felt something tweak in my lower back. The shot struck, as I walked back to the end of the approach I felt my back begin to tighten up. I threw the next shot about half speed, it crossed over and left several pins, which I converted for 268.

I only needed about 160 the last game to make the cut, I managed 180 while crossing over almost every first shot. As I finished, and the adrenaline of the competition subsided, my back tightened up even more. As the bowlers slowly headed for the paddock with their equipment, I sat in the settee for a long time, and wondered how would I ever bowl a match later in the day with my back in this condition. I literally could not pick up my bowling bags and carry them to the locker room. About that time, Dick says to me "nice bowling, aren't you going to put your equipment away?". I told him I didn't think I could carry five bowling balls (a triple back, and a double) to the paddock, I had hurt my back. At that point, without hesitation, Dick asked me if I needed help. He grabbed my equipment, and I followed him to the paddock. When we got to the door, he asked me if I thought it would be O.K. for him to go in the paddock, after all, it is for bowlers only. I thought he was probably kidding, I said "sure Dick, come on in!". He put my equipment in it's place, and asked if I needed any more help. I said no, I headed for my motel room and a hot bath. Later that evening, I lost my match to the eventual winner Kurt Pilon 3-1, I only shot 200 once, my back took a couple of weeks to heal. I forgot about that match the next day, but I will never forget the day the legendary Dick Weber carried my equipment.

USBC's New Top Job - Grow the Sport of Bowling

Growing bowling as a sport is the future focus of the United States Bowling Congress as nearly 1,700 attendees at the 2007 USBC Annual Meeting at the Gaylord Opryland Resort and Convention Center learned in many ways Friday.

Through speeches from organization leaders to the announcements of new television events to a new partnership with a major sports player, everyone in Delta Ballroom A and those watching live on bowl.com, should have come away with the fact that USBC is headed in a new direction.

"We are talking about dramatically changing our focus from a member benefit organization to a sports organization," said USBC Chief Executive Officer Roger Dalkin. "We need to redirect your passion to the sport more than to the membership organization."

Baker noted that the new vision will be achieved when more people are recognizing bowling as a sport and more people are participating in bowling as a sport. Within those priority issues are three goals:

- * Increase USBC youth membership in certified leagues and programs
- * Increase the number of USBC members participating in bowling as a sport
- * Increase the number of people who recognize/perceive bowling as a sport

"This change is one of the first actions we can

take to be that different organization, the organization of the sport of bowling and to be the sport that deserves the recognition and respect of the public, as other sports," Baker said.

Among the ways USBC will help increase the number of people who recognize/perceive bowling as a sport is through television with the announcement of USBC reviving the U.S. Women's Open and sponsoring the new Professional Bowlers Association Summer Series and Women's Tour Trials which will create a 16-bowler exempt field for a 2007-08 PBA Women's Tour. All events will be televised in the fall on ESPN.

In addition, USBC Chief Officer Marketing and Communications Tom Clark announced that basketball star Chris Paul, an avid bowler, will be USBC's newest spokesperson.

"Today, bowling is in a period of transformation or evolution," Carroll said. "The true measurement of turning the corner will not be as much in our membership numbers as it will be in the recognition of bowling at the national level; of truly seeing bowling as a sport again in the eyes of the general public."

Even USBC Hall of Famer Nelson Burton Jr., in closing the Hall of Fame ceremony before Carroll's speech, said: "Our job is to preserve the game, not the pinball games or the bar or the arcade but the game, the ball and the pins."

The wait is finally over for local bowler.

Monday April 9th, would turn out to be one of those memorable days for Joshua "Porkchop" Jackson. He would finally answer one of those nagging questions one always asked them self. Can I do it again? It had been a little over 2 years since Jackson had rolled a prefect game; he had been very close numerous times over the past few weeks. Jackson had rolled games of 287, 286, 290, and 298 and so everyone around him knew the prefect game was coming the question was when.

On Monday night the answer finally came while bowling in the Junior Pro's league at Majestic Lanes in Lynnwood. Jackson would rolled his second perfect game of his young career. The first ball Jackson threw in the 10th was a very nice pocket shot just blowing the pins away for his 10th strike in a row. His second shot was in the pocket but the 9 pin stood for a second until the head pin came across and knocked it over for his 11th strike in a row. There was no doubt about his 12th shot. The ball came off his hand perfectly and Jackson would watch his ball answer that 2 year old question....perfection again. Jackson would roll 19 strikes in a row over the three games, the last four in game one, twelve in the second for his perfect game and the first three in his third game. Jackson's personal record is 20 in a row over two games.

Jackson rolled his first perfect game while bowling for Mariner High School in the annual high school all star match in 2005. Jackson was his high league's MVP in 2006 and 3 time member of the Washington High School All State Bowling Team. Jackson graduated from Mariner in 2006 and is currently attending Edmonds Community College.

Joshua's father was watching his son bowl and was asked, "do you ever get nervous?" "Not until he has the first strike in the 10th, then I get really nervous for him. It is an amazing feeling watching your son throw a perfect game people don't realize how hard it is."

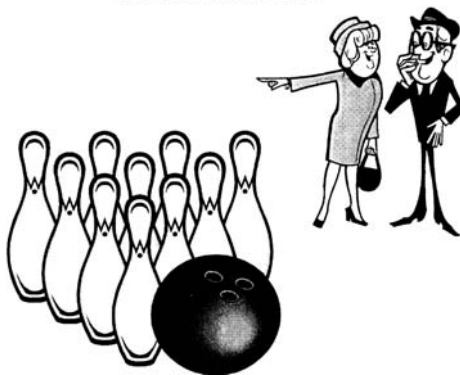
